*Below are listed some of the resources that are best suited to get you fulltext articles. When you use Interlibrary Loan Services, please specify to us that you are in the DMM program, so that we may alert you if we cannot fulfill your request electronically.*

#### ***Discovery Tool – WorldCat Local***

Use this tool at top of the library homepage to search the library's catalog and many of its databases, as well as many external resources – all in one step. It's a good research starting point.

Advanced Search

**EBSCO:** click the HELP button of any EBSCO database to connect to tutorials and documentation to help you search more effectively and use the system features more fully.

- [Academic Search Premier](#) – interdisciplinary in scope, includes much fulltext
- [Business Source Premier](#) – all areas of business are covered, including management and administration
- [Environment Complete](#) deep coverage with some full text articles in agriculture, ecosystem ecology, renewable energy sources, natural resources, pollution, environmental technology, environmental law, public policy, social impacts, urban planning, and more.
- [SocINDEX](#) – partial full text, from sources in sociology and other allied fields

**ProQuest** also provides access to several databases that cover a variety of topics. Some of the databases you might find helpful include:

**PubMed** is the free, publicly-accessible version of MEDLINE. Connect via the Gutman Library homepage to search with special features. Click the **Gutman Library – PhilaU link** in the right frame of your results screen to limit your results to items available for free **and** via Gutman Library online resources. Request other articles via Interlibrary Loan

### **Specialized Resources**

[Homeland Security Digital Library](#)- from the Naval Postgraduate School Center for Homeland Defense and Security; contains organized access to many sources on homeland security, covering public health issues,

natural disasters, various forms of terrorism, and more. Includes governmental and non-governmental documents, both international and domestic.

[MDConsult](#) contains full text of 50 print medical reference works and over 80 medical journals, including the images from these works. Also provides drug information—including FDA Approvals and Safety Notices—guidelines, news, and more. It is a comprehensive resource for the medical professional.- and includes a collection of [Emergency Medicine texts](#).

### E-journal Collections

- **PsycNET** provides fulltext articles from many APA journals. Click the **PsycArticles** tab on your results list to limit your results to fulltext. Request other articles via Interlibrary Loan
- **Science Direct College Edition** provides fulltext access to an interdisciplinary collection of over 800 scholarly, academic publications. Abstracting and indexing is available for several hundred additional titles. Fulltext for articles from these titles can be obtained through Interlibrary Loan
- **SpringerLink** also has a wide array of fulltext articles from a variety of subject areas, including management, disaster planning, and medicine
- **Emerald E-journals** include mostly business-oriented publications that are international in scope. Example: *Disaster Prevention and Management*: 1994 to present
- [BioMed Central](#) “publisher of over 200 peer-reviewed, open access journals”  
Example: *BMC Emergency Medicine*
- [HighwirePress](#) -a searchable collection of medically-oriented journals, hosted by Stanford University. It provides selected full text access to certain of these journals, sometimes after 6-36 months have passed, sometimes immediately. Examples: *Brief Treatment and Crisis Intervention*, *JAMA*

### JournalList Finding Tool: [Find Journals by Title](#)

Access to online fulltext of pertinent publications can be determined through the **Title Browse** or **Subject Browse** features of JournalList.

For example, a **Subject Category** browse under [Health Sciences](#) reveals hundreds of titles, organized into various categories, including Emergency Medicine, Public Health, and more.

Conduct a **Title Browse** to see if there is fulltext online access to a particular journal you want.

A search on [Disaster Prevention and Management](#) reveals that fulltext is available from the Emerald e-journal collection for a specific range of dates (1994 to present), and also from ABI/Inform Global (in the ProQuest system), for a different range of dates (1995 to one year ago).

Be sure to check the holdings information (date ranges for which the publication is accessible) to determine which database holds the article you need.
